
#### Central Ideas

Faith is trusting in the divine revelation, and acting in its reality. Faith is as good as its object gets. True faith generates Hope and Love. The highest object of faith is pleasing God by obedience. Faith demands action, despite the negative reactions or the lack of immediate positive reactions. God's truthfulness and faithfulness is evidently shown in his interactions with his people throughout history.

- 6. Why was Abel's offering right and Cain's wrong? Give options and your opinion.
- 7. Why could Abel still witness while dead? (Due to his faith or God's faithfulness?)
- 8. Why did Enoch walk with God? Does death belong to those in good fellowship with God?
- 9. What does pleasing God mean to believers? What does that take?
- 10. Why did Noah fear God? Does faith has anything to do with it?
- 11. Is there a pattern on how these ancient heroes get their righteousness? By what?
- 12. Does obedience demand full knowledge of God and his plan?
- 13. What was Abraham's hope? What are the City of God and the City of Man? Is that hope the result of Abraham's faith or the cause of it?
- 14. Did Sarah show her faith or/and lack of it? Explain by text. What did God see?
